

"Now the Pharisees who had been sent questioned him (John the Baptist), 'Why then do you baptize if you are not the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?' 'I baptize with water,' John replied, 'but among you stands one you do not know. He is the one who comes after me, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie." John 1:24-26

The ministry of Christ on this earth began with his Baptism by John the Baptist, the son of Zachariah and Elizabeth. John had been preparing the people and telling them that there was a person coming that was greater than he was. As we think of John, the Bible tells us that his clothes were made of camel's hair, and he wore a leather belt around his waist. He ate locusts and honey. This doesn't sound too much like someone that people would flock to, but they did, even the Pharisees and Sadducees. Some of those people he referred to as a "brood of vipers!" and warned them they would be destroyed.

One day Jesus went to the Jordan to be baptized by John. John asked "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?' Jesus replied, 'Let it be so now; it is proper for us to do this to fulfill all righteousness.' Then John consented" Matthew 3:14-15

When Christ was baptized, Heaven opened. We read "Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. ¹¹ And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

This was not a time of honor for very long. Shortly after Christ was baptized, he was tempted by the devil. We read about this in three of the Gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke as being the very first thing recorded. As the song says *"God is Not Dead, nor does he sleep."*

According to what we often read, Jesus fasted for forty days and according to

"At once the Spirit sent him out into the wilderness, and he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him." Mark 1:12-13

Mark he was with the wild animals and had angels taking care of him. How often we hear of animals taking care of someone who is stranded by lying next to them and keeping them warm. The trained animals today are unreal in what they can help people know. Often they can do something to help that individual to aid them physically. As far back as Proverbs 12:10 we hear about helping animals and their place in our lives. "A righteous man regards the life of his animal, But the tender mercies of the wicked are cruel." Did God really care for the animals. He trusted his son's life to them in the wilderness, and even sent angels to attend him. There are many times in the ministry of Christ where animals play an important part.

And angels attended him. I am reminded of the song from Hansel and Gretel from Engelbert Humperdinck's opera. Whether or not we believe in an angel on our shoulder, we know from the Bible that angels did appear and the children lost in the forest in this opera felt protected. It always delights me to hear when faith in God is brought into our world in wondrous ways, telling me that no one can really deny the existence of Christ and His wonderful message. As I read about this opera, one person said that not only is it touching to think about the small children being protected by angels, but knowing that angels attended Christ and they attend me and

the lost child in each of us. This is a wonderful blessing to each of us.

The list concludes with Thaddaeus (or Jude) his brother James (called James, the Lesser or Younger) and Simon called The Zealot who has been called very political, but he was a devout disciple for Christ. *The journey begins!* Prayer: Lord, we know that you are with us every hour of every day, and we know that You love us more than we could ever imagine, enough to give Your life for our sins. Help us to tell others about You as you have asked and live our journey here to glorify you. Amen
