

"One of the pet words of this age is tolerance. It is a good word, but we have tried to stretch it over too great an area. We have applied it, too often, where it does not belong. The word tolerant means liberal and broad-minded. In one sense, it implies the compromise of one's convictions, a yielding of ground upon important issues. However, in the realm of Christian experience there is a need for intolerance. I think Paul calls kindness one of the fruits of the Spirit because it cannot be a part of our lives without God's growth in us. We just can't get up one morning and say "I'm going to be kind to everyone today." Kindness opens us to service to others. It is a slippery road once we choose to accept God's Spirit and let it into our lives. Kindness is goodness in action. Kindness can be compassionate, considerate, sympathetic, humane, or gentle.

Often it depends on the day and our mood, or the way something is presented to us. But through our acceptance of the Holy Spirit into our lives, we can have more kindness.

The other day it was raining, but I needed gas in my car. As I began to pump it a young man came over and offered to help me. I don't know his name and I don't think he wanted any thanks, but I thanked him. I have had the guy picking up grocery carts help me unload mine into the back of the car. I hope I am remembered for kind acts that I do because I want to, not because I feel I have to.

When I was a teenager I worked at Christmas time in a store that sold toys. I had so much fun watching grown men try out trucks on the floor and talking with each other. They were so happy about the truck they were getting for their son, and the women would pick up the dolls and hold them like they were holding a baby, not like the young girl was going to do as she combed the doll's hair or the young man as he pretended banging a truck into a wall to pretend he was knocking a building down!
