David was told that one man, Goliath, was constantly badgering the Israelites and each day he would ask for one of them to battle him as an individual. All of them were afraid of him.

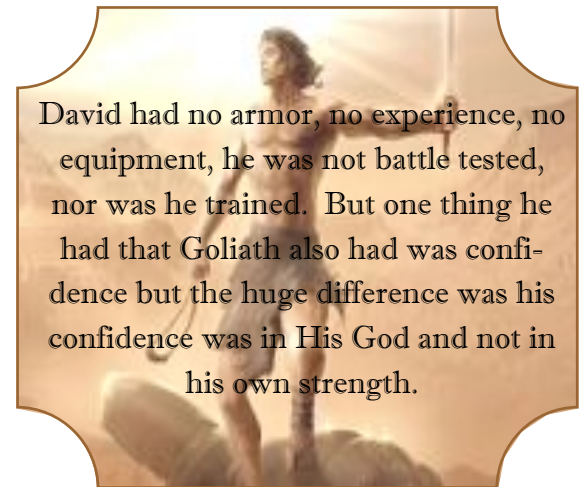

David had no armor, no experience, no equipment, he was not battle tested, nor was he trained. But one thing he had that Goliath also had was confidence but the huge difference was his confidence was in His God and not in his own strength.

The LORD who rescued me from the paw of the lion and the paw of the bear will rescue me from the hand of this Philistine.” Samuel 17 34-37 Saul put armor on him and was ready to send him up against Goliath. Saul did give his blessing to David. *“Saul said to David, ‘Go, and the LORD be with you.’” 1 Samuel 17:37b*

I wonder what David's brothers and the other soldiers thought about this. None of them were willing to go and fight, but this young man was willing to take on the giant.

The armor was too heavy and so David said he would use his sling shot and a few stones. Goliath said *“Am I a dog, that you come at me with sticks? Come here and I'll give your flesh to the birds and the wild animals!” 1 Samuel 17:43-44.*

Sometimes we forget that God is with us and we try to do things on our own, or we become a coward like Saul who

wanted someone else to fight his battles. David saw what had to be done and decided that with God’s help he could do it. The power of prayer is always with us.

We aren’t asked to kill a giant, but we are asked to do other things. The giant may be someone that has wronged us. It may be an addiction to anything, not necessarily drugs. It could be smoking, overeating, etc. It may be to gossip or wasting time or any number of things that stand between us and doing what we should be doing. Sometimes something seemingly insignificant at the time can become that giant that takes over control. First you have to identify the giant, then the victory can be yours.

There is a way to beat that giant. It is the same way that David used so many years ago. He called on his Lord. We have that same opportunity today. We don’t have to do it out in the middle of the field or let anyone else know He is there in our quietness waiting for us to talk with Him. With His help, we can defeat the giant regardless of its size.
