They had been told they could eat from many trees, but there was fruit on one tree in the middle of the garden whose fruit they were not supposed to eat. In fact, according to the Bible, they were told *"Ye shall not eat of it; neither shall ye touch it, lest* "God called to the Man: 'Where are you?' He said, 'I heard you in the garden and I was afraid because I was naked. And I hid.' God said, 'Who told you you were naked? Did you eat from that tree I told you not to eat from?' The Man said, 'The Woman you gave me as a companion, she gave me fruit from the tree, and, yes, I ate it.' God said to the Woman, 'What is this that you've done?' 'The serpent seduced me,' she said, 'and I ate.'" Genesis 3:9-13

ye die." Genesis 3:3 NJV. What kind of tree was it? The apple always gets the blame! It is worth noting that after they ate the fruit of that tree they did not die as we would think of death today. But, they did die to the way of living that had been perfect where they never had to work for anything.

The serpent had told Eve that wouldn't happen. That was enough to make Eve wonder. The serpent seemed to know more than God so when Eve was told by the serpent that she would not die, she believed! In fact the serpent told her she would be much smarter. He said "You won't die. God knows that the moment you eat from that tree, you'll see what's really going on. You'll be just like God, knowing everything, ranging all the way from good to evil." Genesis 3:4-5 (The Message)

Adam blamed the woman that God had sent to be with him! The woman blamed the serpent because the serpent had deceived her and told her she could eat the fruit and not die! The serpent merely suggested that it was good for them to eat that fruit.


If you want to read some light material written with tongue in cheek, read Mark Twain's Diaries of Adam and Eve. But it also includes a beautiful love story and prayer by Eve about the death of one of them before the other. The quote below is from Adam imagining living without Eve.

"After all these years, I see that I was mistaken about Eve in the beginning; it is better to live outside the Garden with her than inside it without her." Mark Twain, Diaries of Adam and Eve

"It was not that Adam ate the apple for the apple's sake, but because it was forbidden. It would have been better for us--oh infinitely better for us--if the serpent had been forbidden." From Mark Twain's Notebook

We can always find someone else to blame when actually the blame lies with us, just as it did with Adam and Eve. We all know right from wrong, but often we are tempted and convince ourselves that doing a particular thing won't hurt anything. Today, even with the knowledge we have, we are still enticed by things that are pleasant to us even though we know they are not good for us.

There is always someone else to blame and there is always someone who is willing to tempt us.
