The spies scared the people so bad they cried into the night in fear. The people wanted to kill Moses and Aaron and said they would be better back in slavery in Egypt.

Caleb saw it differently. He believed that God would do what he promised. He interrupted the people and said "Let's go up and take the land-now. We can do it." Numbers 13:30 The Bible tells us that God was angry with the people because they were faithless. Moses pleaded with God not to do what he threatened to do to these chosen people who were being offered a beautiful land. Caleb and Joshua tried to settle them down, but they threatened to stone them. Finally God appeared to them in a tent meeting. No matter how much Caleb and Joshua promised that God would be with them, they would not listen.

Eventually Joshua and Caleb were the only two that were allowed to go into the promised land, but that was another 40 years of wandering around in the desert. Researchers believe Caleb was about 40 years old when he was one of the spies to see the beautiful land, but by the times they had wandered in the



desert, he was 85 years old and still as dedicated to God as he had been at 40.



Many of us would have retired to the rocking chair a long time ago, but not Caleb. He even wanted to work for the land when it was finally given to him.

Caleb was given first choice for the part of the land that he wanted. Do we sometimes receive rewards like that today? I think we do if we are faithful. Unfortunately the story of the Israelites wandering in the desert for years and eventually dying before they got there is very sad.
