## Can you come to dinner?

"Parable of the Wedding Feast"



"For I say unto you, that none of those men which were bidden shall taste of my supper." Luke 14:24

That is a pretty harsh statement. Just because they refused an invitation to a banquet they are never going to taste that banquet again. This wasn't just any banquet. It was a special invitation just as we receive a special invitation from God. He chose this story or parable to make a point. A parable is a word-picture which uses an image or story to illustrate a truth or lesson. I think Christ was trying to make the point that we never know when we are going to be called, and He wants to be sure that we are ready and have the wonderful food of His banquet. This particular parable is found in Luke 14:16-24.

Wedding Banquet A certain man had a feast on his fine estate in town. He laid a festive table and wore a wedding gown *He sent invitations to his neighbors far* and wide But when the meal was ready, each one of them replied! Chorus The master rose up in anger, called his servants by name, Said, "Go into the town, fetch the blind and the lame. Fetch the peasant and the pauper for this I have willed--*My* banquet must be crowded and my table must be filled!" Chorus When all the poor had assembled, there still was room to spare, So the master demanded, "Go search everywhere, To the highways and the byways and force them to come in, *My* table must be filled, before the banquet can begin!" Chorus Now God has written a lesson for the rest of mankind, If we're slow in responding, He may leave us behind. *He's preparing a banquet for that* great and glorious day, When the Lord and master calls us, be certain not to say. CHORUS: I cannot come! I cannot come to the banquet, don't trouble me now, I have married a wife, I have bought me a cow, I have fields and commitments that cost a pretty sum, Pray hold me excused, I cannot come!\*

"Trust God. He may be leading you in a certain direction, but He doesn't always give you all the details. That's because we're to trust Him, knowing that whatever He had planned will come to pass. Trust God."

If you read the Scripture with the verse above or read the words of the song printed here you will see the excuses are pretty lame. But aren't our excuses lame sometimes too. The words in the song follow the same examples set in the Scriptures. God has prepared a banquet for everyone. He has plenty and everyone is welcome. If we do not go, we are the ones losing. The gift is always there for the taking. Notice the outstretched hands in the picture at the beginning.

It wasn't that they weren't ever going to have a chance to eat again. But Christ was trying to tell the people that if they refused the love of God and His salvation, they would be doomed and eventually it would be too late.

As a youth, I learned this parable in this song. It was lively and when I tried to have some of the people in our church sing it, they thought it was too disruptive until they heard the words and realized the message it was sending. I realize now that some of the songs the youth sing today may seem disruptive to some, but the songs speak to them. And I think that is why Christ chose to talk in parables. He wanted to make sure the people understood the message. The form is different, but the message is always the same.

It is important to know that this parable followed a time when Christ was being challenged by the authorities. He had been invited to dine with the Pharisees. He was gaining popularity and they were concerned. They needed everything against him they could gather. He saw a man who was sick and questioned them "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath or not?" (Luke 14:3) They had been caught! He healed the man. Then he asked "Which of you, if you have a son or an ox that has fallen into a well on a Sabbath day, will not immediate*ly pull him out?*" (Luke 14:5) He knew their laws as well as they did, and He could use this knowledge to catch them up in some of their ways.

He also noticed they chose certain places to sit at dinner, so he questioned them again. He told them that when they were invited to a wedding banquet, they should not take the places of honor because someone more distinguished may have been invited. He told them they should take the least important place because then the host seeing where they were seated may ask them to move to a more important place and be honored. Then he said *"For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."* (Luke 14:11).

This all precedes the parable of the wedding banquet. Jesus had been invited as a guest. He was well aware of why he had been invited. They had not realized that Jesus was going to be able to take this invitation and compare it to the invitation to salvation.

We are invited every day to a beautiful banquet. The invitation is always there, but we have to accept that invitation. We have to be willing to be a servant, but eventually we will be honored.
