Measure for Measure

"The Lord does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart." 1 Samuel 16:7

We so often form our first judgment of people by their appearance. I'm so thankful that God doesn't judge me that way and that He understands I sometimes judge others too early. Many times we see only the outside. We see beauty, talents, fame and such, but God sees straight to our heart and knows what we and the other people are really like. He accepts all of us as we are.

Many years ago there was a musical by Rogers and Hammerstein that really hit the social issues of that time. It was called "You've got to be taught." from South Pacific. The musical was based on a book by John Michener. I think it applies to the situation in this devotional.

The line before the song says that prejudice is "not born in you! It happens after you're born..." It raised a lot of controversy then, but it still has a powerful message to each of today as we judge other people. It is sung by a lieutenant who has fallen in love with a Polynesian girl and a nurse who has fallen in love with a Frenchman of

questionable character who lives on the island. Some of the words are:

"You've got to be taught to be afraid Of people whose eyes are oddly made, And people whose skin is a diff'rent shade,

You've got to be carefully taught."
You've got to be taught before it's too late.

Before you are six or seven or eight, To hate all the people your relatives hate.

Some people dream of success, while other people get up every morning and make it happen.

You've got to be carefully taught!" In the Scripture for this devotional we have Samuel being guilty of just this. He needs a prince, some one to replace him when he is gone. He is sent the oldest son of Jesse and thinks this is the one God has chosen to succeed him. God tells him to reject him. Finally when Samuel gets to the last son of Jesse, David, he is accepted by God for Samuel's successor. Why were the others not acceptable? We don't know. Often though we can make a similar mistake and judge some one by appearance. We can't see inside the heart as God can. There are people in this world that many consider beautiful on

the outside, but then find out that person is not so beautiful on the inside. There are many who may not look so good on the outside to us but they are beautiful on the inside.

Have you ever stopped to think that the best book of all, the Bible, usually has a very plain cover!

From my point of view, God is the light that illuminates the darkness, even if it does not dissolve it, and a spark of divine light is within each of us.

By the same token, we cannot judge another person by what someone else says. Often we can find that the other person may have a conflict of interest with the person and has prejudged and also wants you to know what he has prejudged to be correct!




Perhaps they had an emergency. Does that give us the right to invade their privacy.
